Indices of Deprivation 2015

The Indices of Deprivation 2015 have been released by DCLG. They provide an update to the Indices of Deprivation 2010 and measure relative deprivation between areas throughout England.

The indicators have remained largely unaltered to allow a comparison over time between the data sets.

At the local authority level North Yorkshire and York remain among the least deprived in England in terms of the overall Index of Multiple Deprivation. Scarborough continues to be the most deprived district in North Yorkshire.


The Indices are available at small area level - for Lower Super Output Areas. At this geographical scale pockets of high levels of deprivation are found across North Yorkshire and York, particularly when looking at the individual domains and sub-domains which make up the Indices, such as Geographical Barriers to services.

Director of public health annual report 2015



The recently released Annual Report of the Director of Public Health for North Yorkshire this year focuses on children and young people in the county. It explores some of the health challenges that they face at different stages of their lives.

The report is called 'The health of our children: growing up healthy in North Yorkshire'. It combines contributions from young people on what being healthy means to them, together with evidence from statistical sources, to identify key issues affecting their health and wellbeing. It goes on to outline the ways in which all agencies can work together to manage these issues.

Population estimates for mid-2014

Local authority level mid-year population estimates for 2014 have been released by the Office for National Statistics (ONS), updating the mid-2013 estimates.



The mid-2014 population of North Yorkshire is 601,500, around 1,200 people less than the mid-2013 estimate of 602,700 people. This is the first decrease in the population of the county since the mid-2000 estimates. The population of the City of York has increased from 202,400 in mid-2013 to 204,400 in mid-2014.

At district council level Craven, Ryedale and Selby have seen moderate increases in population while the other districts within North Yorkshire, and in particular Harrogate and Richmondshire, have seen substantial decreases in population over the 12 month period. This is partly due to the large number of people estimated to have moved from North Yorkshire to overseas locations, particularly in the 20-34 years age group, but it is also due to the reduced number of armed forces personnel stationed within the county. This is particularly significant in Richmondshire and Harrogate.

Small area population estimates for mid-2014 are due to be released on 25 November and will include updated population estimates for Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs), district council wards, Clinical Commissioning Groups and the national parks.

Small area income estimates updated

The ONS have released estimates of household income at Middle Super Output Area (MSOA) level. The figures are model-based estimates for 2012/13, which update the previous 2007/08 estimates.

The new data set provides figures for average household weekly income, both before and after housing costs. They also include a small area measure of housing affordability, for which the North Yorkshire data have been mapped and can be downloaded from <http://www.streamlis.org.uk/QuickLink.aspx?id=1160>
