Hambleton summary

Hambleton is a rural area, the economy is based around market towns. There is no significant industry. The economy is based on farming, tourism and public services.

The focus of economic growth is in Northallerton - with the development in North Northallerton and the future redevelopment of the former prison site.




The population is ageing - 27.1% of all households are pensioners



Full time weekly earnings for Hambleton residents (£479.50) are lower than the North Yorkshire level (£487.70). The reverse is the case for workplace earnings which average £466.60 in the district and £460.10 county wide. Both are significantly lower than national earnings (£529.60 / £529.00).

The economy of Hambleton



Manufacturing (13.4% of employment) is the dominant employment sector followed by health (11.1%) and agriculture (8.7%). Retail, accommodation & food services and public administration come next, each accounting for 7.8%.

Compared to England, Hambleton has proportionally more than **six** times as much employment in agriculture, around **twice** as much in manufacturing and in public administration but only **a third** as much in the information and communication and in the financial and insurance sectors

There were over **1,000** more manufacturing jobs in the district in 2015 compared to 2014, an increase of **22.4%.** Business administration and support services also saw a big jump in employment with over **700** more jobs, a **31.9%** increase on 2014.

Closure of Northallerton Prison in 2013 and the Rural Payments Agency in 2014 resulted in the **loss of 600 direct jobs** and threatens further supply chain jobs



Strategic planning and infrastructure

Local Plan – consulted on the issues and options. Consultation on preferred options expected late 2016.

HDC CIL Charging Schedule adopted in 2015. Prioritised infrastructure spend on identified Regulation 123 list - the focus of which is essential infrastructure to support North Northallerton.

Infrastructure Delivery Statement – Initial discussions between NYCC and HDC Officers have commenced on developing a joint agreement on infrastructure delivery to support planned growth.

Northallerton prison site purchased by Hambleton DC

Development partner appointed to deliver mixed use housing/retail/leisure

Potential to dramatically re-shape the nature of the town centre

Linked to the scale of housing development at North Northallerton there is the opportunity to see further growth in the town but longer term aspirations and role as County Town still needs to be addressed

Opportunities to address some of the current transport issues in the town can only be delivered with the required growth

Strategic Economic Plan Refresh –

Update to the SEP includes reference to a Growth Deal funding bid for £1m in support of Central Northallerton redevelopment (focused on former prison site).

Difficulties with being able to demonstrate a 5 year supply of land available for residential development has led to a number of successful planning application appeals in Stokesley and Easingwold.

Environment

During the storms of December 2015 and January 2016 in Hambleton:




28 properties and businesses reported internal flooding across 18 different locations

5 properties flooded in Sessay, the community with the greatest concentration

Several roads and bridges were closed including the A168 (near Thirsk), A170 (near Kirby), A172 (near Northallerton) and the A1 at Catterick

Reports of flooding affecting gardens, garages and footpaths were widespread

Principle source of property flooding was from small watercourses



Accessibility

40 to 50 closures per day of North Northallerton level crossing, used by freight and passenger trains

NYCC & HDC options for a solution to the rail crossing include:



on-line bridge over the railway line tunnel under the railway line new link road behind Willow Beck Road retail park Northallerton bypass options

Rail options – potential diversion of line

Bridge to be built in Thirsk to improve access to Dalton industrial estate

Study to be commissioned into railway station access at Northallerton and at Thirsk



4.8km bypass of Bedale, Aiskew and Leeming Bar opened ahead of schedule in August 2016, easing congestion and reducing traffic through town

Innovative Easingwold minibus project

Good transport links to A1 and A19

Bedale, Aiskew & Leeming Bar bypass opened

Limited public transport in more rural areas and between market towns


Impact of maintenance on major routes




The area is served by York District, The Friarage, St James and James Cook acute hospitals together with community hospitals in Thirsk and Easingwold






